What are SATs?

- Range of tests and tasks for assessment in Year Six
- Largely used as a judgement of how well schools are performing

SATs

How will they be marked and reported?

- Children will be given scaled scores where a score of 100 represents the 'national standard'.
- The national standard score will be decided when the pupils have taken the test and papers marked which will give their raw score (total number of marks)
- Once the national standard has been set, the government will use a statistical technique to transform the raw score into a scaled score.
- The scale will have a lower end point below 100 and an upper end point above 100.

SATs

How will they be marked and reported?

- Your child's test results will include:
 - ~ a raw score (number of marks awarded)
 - ~ a scaled score
 - ~ confirmation of whether or not they attained the national standard

Teacher Assessment

- Teacher Assessment will be made for English writing, English reading, mathematics and science.
- Children will be assessed for the following subjects:

English Writing

working towards the expected standard *

working at expected standard (EXS: expected standard)

working at greater depth within the expected standard (GDS: greater depth)

English Reading

do not meet the expected standard *

working at expected standard

Mathematics

do not meet the expected standard *

working at expected standard (EXS: expected standard)

Science

do not meet the expected standard (HNM: has not met)

working at expected standard (EXS: expected standard)

** There will be further categories of where they are within that assessment*

Monday 9 May	<u>English</u> Reading test (60 minutes)
Tuesday 10 May	<u>English</u> Grammar, punctuation and spelling test Paper 1: short answer questions (45 minutes) Paper 2: spelling (15 minutes)
Wednesday 11 May	<u>Mathematics</u> Paper 1: arithmetic test (30 minutes) Paper 2: reasoning test (40 minutes)
Thursday 12 May	<u>Mathematics</u> Paper 3: reasoning test (40 minutes)
